The U.K. based Times Higher Education (THE), the publisher of the world's widely referenced university rankings, announced the rankings of the world's best universities by subject on Wednesday, 28 October, 2020. Eastern Mediterranean University (EMU) appeared in the 401-500 band in Business and Economics and 601-800 band in Engineering and Physical Sciences. EMU has become the only university from the Turkish Republic of Northern Cyprus (TRNC) to be included in these rankings.

In the ranking of Turkish universities in the field of Business and Economics, EMU has ranked 2nd after Bilkent University, outranking METU, Boğaziçi University and Istanbul Technical University. A total of 9 universities from Turkey appeared in the said list. As per the ranking of Turkish universities in the field of Engineering, EMU ranks 8th after Koç University, Bilkent University, Sabancı University, Boğaziçi University, Istanbul Technical University, Özyeğin University and Atatürk University. A total of 30 universities from Turkey appeared in the list in question. Outranking METU and Sabancı University in the

ranking of Turkish universities in the field of Physical Sciences, EMU ranks 6th after Bilkent University, Koç University, Atatürk University, Atılım University and Boğaziçi University. A total of 28 universities from Turkey appeared in the said list.

Eastern Mediterranean University Urban Research and Development Center (EMU URDC) Chair Prof. Dr. Şebnem Hoşkara released a message titled “31 October World Cities Day: Valuing Our Communities and Cities”. Prof. Dr. Hoşkara’s message reads as follows:

“31 October has been specified as the World Cities Day upon the decision of the United Nations (UN) General Assembly No. 68/239. World Cities Day, as set by the UN, is expected to greatly stimulate the international community’s interest in global urbanization, enhance cooperation between countries in meeting opportunities and address the challenges

of urbanization, and contribute to sustainable urban development worldwide. The theme of the 2020 World Cities Day has been announced as “Valuing Our Communities and Cities”

Impact of COVID-19

As the United Nations stated, the impact of COVID-19 is reshaping urban life around the world. In various parts of the world, local communities have started to play a key role in contributing to keeping people safe and maintaining some economic activity.

Theoretically, the concept of ‘community value’ includes local volunteering and people organized in their neighborhoods as well as social movements that challenge poverty, systematic discrimination and racism. Throughout the pandemic period, individual households in urban areas provided favourable environments for work and education from home, while communities in unauthorised settlements and especially in slums made an effort to make significant contributions to social and economic life.

“Let’s Put Our Communities at the Heart of Cities of the Future”

The latest World Cities Report of the

UN Human Settlements Program (UN-HABITAT) highlights the importance and benefits of cities that involve all stakeholders, including local communities, in decision-making mechanisms to promote sustainable cities. In this context, the UN Secretary General António Guterres stated that cities and communities are at the forefront of the fight against COVID-19, but emphasized that only with this awareness and collectively, we can create truly sustainable cities for everyone. Guterres’ direct statement on the subject is striking in this context: “When urban communities are engaged in policy and decision making and are empowered by financial resources, the results are more inclusive and resilient. Let’s put our communities at the heart of the cities of the future.”

From this point of view, it should be noted that, in order to create contemporary societies and sustainable and livable cities, it is the obligation of policy makers, central and local governments to systematically and strategically involve communities, that is, all stakeholders, in urban planning, design, implementation and monitoring processes in order to design the cities of the future together.

The statements, demands and activities of the civil society, communities, urban dwellers and city users should not be ignored and they should be taken seriously. Recognition of the value of communities must continue beyond the virus outbreak. As emphasized by the UN, in the transition to a new sustainable urban normality, new state policies are needed for local communities, job creation, provision of basic services, green-economic transformation, provision of adequate housing and public spaces, and the recreation of local values.

However, such policies and practices are, of course, only possible in countries where ‘state mechanism’ works efficiently. Unfortunately, we live far from such an environment in Northern Cyprus. In these negative thoughts, I wish you all a happy World Cities Day!

EMU FACULTY OF DENTISTRY RELEASES A STATEMENT ON THE 2020-2021 ACADEMIC YEAR OPENING

Eastern Mediterranean University (EMU) Faculty of Dentistry academic staff member and Molecular Biology and Genetics Specialist Havva Özgen Kılğöz wrote an opening statement for EMU Faculty of Dentistry on the start of the 2020-2021 Academic Year. The following statements were included in the declaration titled “Nobel: A Belated Thank You”:

“The 2020 Nobel Prizes found their owners. Two female scientists, Emmanuelle Charpentier and Jennifer A. Doudna, were awarded the Nobel Prize in Chemistry for their efforts in the development of the CRISPR-Cas genome editing technique. These sentences sound like a last minute news for the agencies, right? If you are lucky, you may have heard this news, which is served, only one day a year, through television or radio. So what is this Nobel Prize? Who is given for what reason? Let’s examine in detail the Nobel Prize, which is not paid the necessary attention by the media, either printed or audio-visual. Let’s combine the power of science and investigative journalism.”

Nobel Prize

This prestigious award, which dates back 120 years, was initiated on the will of the Swedish scientist Alfred Nobel, the inventor of dynamite, to reward scientists who served humanity. Alfred Nobel, who died in 1896, left behind 355 patents and countless inventions that developed the science mind and industry in return for years of hard work. Interested not only in science but also in literature, art and peace, Nobel also has his own poems and dramatic works. Most of the companies he established are still among the important industrial companies in the world economy. Nobel gave his biggest message when he passed away in 1896. He devoted most of his life to science and bequeathed all his wealth to be used in the Physics, Chemistry, Physiology or Medicine, Literature and Peace Awards. Although years passed after his death, his contributions to science have never been forgotten, thanks to the inventions and values he left behind.

Pamuk and Sancar

The enormous spirituality that underlies the Nobel Prize, the most prestigious award in the world, is a great gift that has been and

continues to be given not only to those who have been awarded this prize, but to all scientists. In 2006, Turkish writer Orhan Pamuk, who made us proud, won the Nobel Prize in Literature. Pamuk made history as the first Turkish writer to receive this award. These outstanding achievements are worthy of recognition. Another very valuable scientist, Aziz Sancar, born and raised in Mardin, Turkey, completed his studies in difficult conditions and in 2015, was awarded the Nobel Prize for Chemistry for his work on the repair of DNA. This has become a source of pride and hope for all Turkish scientists; It has been clearly shown that success is not impossible under any circumstances, and that great achievements can only emerge with hard work, creativity and effort.

Marie Curie

Marie Curie, who was the first woman to be awarded the Nobel Prize, was mentioned frequently in that period with her studies in physics in 1903. 8 years later, she was also awarded the Nobel Prize in Chemistry. Rosalind Franklin, known for her contributions in the discovery of the molecular structure of DNA, one of the greatest developments in the 20th century, got cancer and died due to the radiation she was exposed to during her research at the height of her career. She made great contributions to X-ray analysis and created the first X-ray photographs of the double helix structure of DNA. If Franklin had lived, she would have shared the 1962 Nobel Prize in Physiology or Medicine with Francis Crick, James Watson and Maurice Wilkins.

Scientists Who Could Not Receive Their Awards

In addition to these, there have been such cases in history that the scientists who won the Nobel Prize could not receive their awards due to the governments’ obstruction due to political reasons. For example, it was written in the dark pages of history that the Adolf Hitler’s government did not allow Richard Kuhn (Chemistry, 1938), Adolf Butenandt (Chemistry, 1939) and Gerhard Domagk (Physiology or Medicine, 1939) to receive the awards in 1938 and 1939. There were also years when the tension between countries took hold of science. That is why many scientists in the following years did



not receive or refused their awards due to political pressure. In addition, Nobel Prizes could not be awarded during the World War II.

The Nobel Prize is awarded to people who shed light on the future and new beginnings. In history, there have been some who, like Rosalind Franklin, did not see the reward they deserved in their lifetime. Aziz Sancar, on the other hand, was awarded the Nobel Prize in Chemistry in 2015, years later, on the subjects he has been working on since the 1970s. Nobel Prize awarded to scientific studies is not a prompt thank you but a belated one.

“We Conduct Our Studies in the Light of Science”

The importance of scientific studies has been well understood by every segment of the society in these troubled days when we are experiencing the pandemic process. In this context, we think that the only thing that will carry societies forward is SCIENCE, and we wish scientific studies in our country to be supported and encouraged more. Who knows, maybe the Nobel Prize will be awarded to one of us in the future! Our Faculty of Dentistry continues to work as part of the EMU family in the light of science with an awareness of its responsibilities. Endless thanks to all scientists who deserve to be remembered for their hard work, the great sacrifices they made at the expense of their own lives, and for their struggles under harsh conditions without ever giving up! ”
