“ASHINA” TEAM COMPOSED OF EMU STUDENTS INVITED TO TEKNOFEST 2025

ASHINA Teknofest Team composed of Eastern Mediterranean University (EMU) students brought great pride to the university following receiving invitation for the Teknofest Air Defence Systems Competition to be held in Istanbul on 17 – 21 September 2025. Last year, receiving the first place award in the Teknofest Flying Car Simulation Competition, team ASHINA aims to represent EMU and the Turkish Republic of Northern Cyprus in the Air Defence Systems Competition, one of the most extensive categories of Teknofest, to be organized in 52 main categories within the fellowship of ASELSAN.

“Advanced to Top 65 Teams”

The team progressed through the competition by successfully completing the Preliminary Design Report (PDR) stage, placing among the top 250 teams. They then moved forward through the Critical Design Report (CDR) stage, reaching the top 65. After completing the System Capability Video stage, the team earned a spot as a finalist and was invited to the major event in Istanbul.

About the Project

The ASHINA team developed an autonomous air defence system equipped with target detection capabilities. The system plays a key role in national security and could potentially be used against aerial targets like drones in the future.

The team explained, “We decided to enter the competition in September 2024. From then until February, we carried out planning and analysis.



We completed the Preliminary Design Report (PDR) in March and the Critical Design Report (CDR) in May. In August, we uploaded our System Capability Video to YouTube. We will participate in the finals in Istanbul from 17–21 September 2025. From March to the end of June, we conducted our work and tests at the CMPE227 laboratories of the EMU Computer Engineering Department.”

Making remarks on the topic, EMU Rector Prof. Dr. Hasan Kılıç said; “We are thrilled that the ASHINA team, made up of our students, has been invited to the internationally prestigious Teknofest 2025. Their achievement is a testament to EMU’s dedication to science, technology, and innovation. We wish the team every success at

the finals in Istanbul and sincerely congratulate all the students and faculty advisors who contributed to this accomplishment”.

Team captain Furkan Batı Bilgiler, a third-year student from EMU Information Systems Engineering, oversees the project’s electronic and mechanical systems. Cemre Yeşil, a fourth-year Computer Engineering student, manages team communications and works on software systems and algorithm design. Alper Önder, a second-year Software Engineering student, is responsible for developing the artificial intelligence components, while Doğan Efe Çiğdem, a fourth-year Computer Engineering student, plays a key role in advancing the electronic systems.

Eastern Mediterranean University (EMU) and Champion Angels Association has recently signed a collaboration and scholarship protocol with the aim of offering opportunities and scholarship support to students who will study at EMU. EMU Rector Prof. Dr. Hasan Kılıç and Champion Angels Association's Chairperson Ruşen Yücesoylu Karakaya signed the said protocol on Monday, 11 August 2025 at 11:00 a.m. during a signing session held at the EMU Rector's Office building.

EMU Vice Rector for Student Affairs Prof. Dr. Sonuç Zorlu, EMU International, TR and TRNC Promotion Coordinator and Champion Angels Association Executive Board Member Murat Aktuğralı and, Champion Angels Association Executive Board Members were also present during the signing session.

Scholarship Opportunity for Students

Within the scope of the protocol, Turkish Republic of Northern Cyprus (TRNC) citizens and/or students who have completed their high school education in TRNC within an uninterrupted duration of 4 years, who will register EMU's associate or undergraduate programs (excluding International Joint Programs, programs offered at the Medicine and Dentistry Faculties and Summer School) for the first time will be offered 100% scholarships as of 2025-2026 Academic Year Fall Semester. The selection of students who will be granted with scholarships will be carried out by the association and, EMU will be notified in writing at the beginning of the registration period. Scholarships will be valid in accordance with their achievement statuses throughout their studies.

"EMU: A University for Community"

Making remarks during the signing session, EMU Rector Prof. Dr. Hasan Kılıç recalled

the earthquake of 6 February 2023, pointed out that the disaster significantly influenced the shift in societal attitudes and underscored that the importance given to social projects has grown even more as a result. Noting that Isias case is a significant case bringing the community on a common ground, Prof. Dr. Kılıç said; "EMU is a university for community. Therefore, as EMU, we deeply felt the sorrow caused by the losses during the earthquake. We remain committed to supporting initiatives that honour the memory of our Champion Angels. Today, we are signing a protocol for one such project, and EMU will continue to advance in partnership with our association". Underlining that the protocol consists of providing both financial and moral support to the students, Prof. Dr. Kılıç concluded by saying that, through this protocol, many young people will fulfil their dreams, becoming graduates of EMU.

Applications will be submitted via a dedicated link and online form on the EMU student portal, and the results will be communicated to the Association's representatives by the EMU Rector's Office. Additionally, under the protocol, Association members will have access to in-service training seminars and discounted foreign language courses at the Continuing Education Center.

Eastern Mediterranean University (EMU) Rector Prof. Dr. Hasan Kılıç released a message on the 51st anniversary of Liberation of Famagusta. The message of Prof. Dr. Kılıç reads as follows:

“With this history and cultural heritage, the city of Famagusta or Gazimağusa, home to our university, is among the most treasured cities of the Turkish Republic of Northern Cyprus. Exactly 51 years ago, during the second phase of 1974 Peace Operation, the Turkish Cypriot community courageously fought for their freedom on these lands, demonstrating remarkable resistance and sacrifice, and succeeded in liberating Famagusta.

This significant day stands as a symbol of our nation's unbreakable unity and our freedom, which have been entrusted to us by the ultimate sacrifice of our honoured martyrs. Because of the bravery and selflessness of our valiant veterans, we are able to face the future with optimism as a more resilient society.

Famagusta remains a precious gem of our country, celebrated for its historical legacy, cultural richness, stunning coastline, and as the home of EMU. As EMU, we are proud of the positive impact we have on the city's social, cultural, and economic life, and I truly believe that our growth and progress will continue hand in hand with the city.

On this occasion, I warmly celebrate the 51st anniversary of Famagusta's liberation. I honour our dear martyrs who sacrificed their lives for the homeland with deep gratitude and remembrance, and I respectfully salute our heroic veterans.”

PROF. DR. OSMAN M. KARATEPE RELEASES A STATEMENT ON BEHALF OF EMU-ATAUM REGARDING THE 51ST ANNIVERSARY OF LIBERATION OF FAMAGUSTA



On behalf of Eastern Mediterranean University Atatürk Research and Application Center (EMU-ATAUM), Prof. Dr. Osman M. Karatepe released a message on the occasion of 51st anniversary of Famagusta's liberation. The message by Prof. Dr. Karatepe reads as follows:

“Regaining its freedom during the second phase of the 1974 Peace Operation, the city of Famagusta is one of the most important cities in the TRNC.

In the challenging period leading up to the 1974 Cyprus Peace Operation, Famagusta, known as Mağusa in Turkish, was designated as one of ten districts. This district comprised four Turkish neighbourhoods—Surlar İçı, Sakarya, Karakol, and Baykal—and was defended by the fighters known as ‘mücahit’, who successfully barred Greek Cypriots from entering these Turkish areas. The fighters showed remarkable resistance for an extended time, and with the support of the Turkish military forces – the Mehmetçik – during the Second Peace Operation, they ultimately secured victory.

After a steadfast resistance culminating in a major victory, the city formerly known as Mağusa was renamed Gazimağusa. The name change was first formalized on 9 March 1976, following a decision by the Municipality of Famagusta and the Council of Ministers of the Turkish Federated State of Cyprus. The official geographic adoption and legal recognition of the name ‘Gazimağusa’ came into effect with a Confidential Decision dated 17 December 1980. From that point onward, all official matters regarding the city have used the name ‘Gazimağusa’.

On the 51st anniversary of Gazimağusa's liberation, we honour with gratitude and remembrance our heroic Mücahit and Mehmetçik who sacrificed their lives for the prosperity and peace of the Turkish Cypriot people, and we pay our respectful and loving tribute to our veterans.”
